The St. Francis Middle School is a wonderful place. Three words to describe it are friendship, unity, and fun. Throughout the year, students in the middle school participate in many different activities.

The middle school students also attend Mass on Tuesdays. The middle school students participated in Spirit Week during May, which consisted of a talent show, an assembly and some special theme days. Students in 6th, 7th, and 8th grade had the opportunity to take part in the school's talent show and proved to the other students throughout the school that there really is a lot of talent in middle school. The middle school students also participated in the Jump Rope/Hoops for Heart event, which is held every year in May.

The 7th and 8th graders also get the chance to take

some special classes, known as electives. They are Drama, Art, Newspaper, Yearbook, Science Lab, Web Page, Spanish, Math Counts, Band, and Gym. During the school year, the middle school students take a variety of different field trips. The 6th grade class travels over to Mill Pond Park, where they search for crayfish. The 7th grade class takes a trip up by Traverse City where they board a ship and investigate the waters of Lake Michigan. The 8th grade class gets the chance to spend a day at Cedar Point towards the end of the school year, before they head off to high school.

Besides all the fun activities that the students participate in throughout the year, they also must work very hard at maintaining good grade averages. The teachers prepare many fun and exciting ways to take learning to a totally new level. Students in St. Francis Middle School complete a variety of reports, projects and homework assignments that inspire learning and studying. To make studying more enjoyable for a test, some of the teachers provide quiz bowls and study sheets, which help the students prepare for test days.
