Adult Formation: What Are We Celebrating Now?




Great Feasts of the Liturgical Year

Fr. James Conlon returned to St. Francis to present the history, scriptural basis, and liturgical development of many of the great feasts we celebrate in the Catholic Church.

Participants learned the difference between a Solemnity, Memorial, and Feast, plus the order of precedence. We talked about liturgical seasons and looked at how vestment color helps to explain the type of celebration.

Fr. James discussed major feasts of the Lord, of the Blessed

Virgin Mary, the Feast of All Saints, and then looked at two Saints: Cecilia and Francis. He also talked about how some feast days can actually be connected to special churches or other places in the life of the Church, for example, the Feast of the Dedication of the Lateran Basilica.




GRADUATION

Rust Foundation Awards Science Grant to St. Francis School

St. Francis School received a grant in the amount of \$20,000 from The Rust Foundation on August 15, 2007 to improve and more fully equip its science laboratory, which will create an enhanced learning environment for students in the areas of life, physical and earth science.

Bruce and Beth Rust sponsored the grant on behalf of St. Francis School where they have two sons enrolled. The Rust Foundation, located in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania was established through The Rust Engineering Company by Bruce's great grandfather. Since its inception, the Foundation has awarded grants to organizations including schools, hospitals and social service agencies locally and nationally.

Through the science curriculum at St. Francis School, students learn to think critically and independently. They develop a capacity for rational judgments about everyday events based on scientific principles. Furthermore, in a culture that's increasingly shaped by science and technology, teachers integrate Catholic values into the curriculum to help students develop a sense of admiration



and reverence for the world God created for them.

By purchasing state-of-the-art science equipment, supplies and accessories with funding from The Rust Foundation, students will be better prepared to link the concepts learned at school to the larger world. Children of all interest, skill and ability levels can learn to affect change positively by combining their imaginations with the tools of science to benefit humanity.

On Sunday June 24th a small but enthusiastic group of St. Francis parishioners traveled to our sister parish, Corpus Christi Catholic Community in Detroit, to deliver the groceries gathered during that weekend's food drive. The groceries were used to feed lunch to the kids attending the **Summer Activities for Youth Achieving** *Integrated Hearts & Minds* (S.A.Y.A. IHM) program—summer day camp.

S.A.Y.A. IHM is a four-week summer enrichment program for youth ages 6 to 17 in Corpus Christi's community. The objective of the program is to provide opportunities for community youth to engage in healthy activities (mind, body and spirit) to develop

meaningful skills and relationships that will help them be successful during their summer break and throughout life.

Over 148 youth attended this year's program. Most of the families of these children do not have the economic means to pay for the lunches.

Today in Dafur, a region in the Sudan in Northeast Africa, hundreds of thousands of Africans are victims of a scorched earth policy of summary executions, pillage, rape, sexual assault, child conscription, and forced displacement. Thousands have fled, and are fleeing to neighboring Chad and other areas to escape the genocide.

Thinking about New Orleans: An Undate on Adon

An Update on Adopt-a-House/Rebuild-a-Home 2007Lenten Appeal

Hurricane Katrina struck just over two years ago and brought catastrophic damage to the city of New Orleans and states along the Gulf Coast. The community of St. Francis acted swiftly. We had special collections in September. We sent cards and



personal care kits in October. We had our first conversation with Fr. Bernard of St. Paul the Apostle in November, and during Lent 2006 we welcomed Fr. Bernard to Ann Arbor to kick off our tile drive. We raised enough money to replace the floor in the church, and many of our parishioners have visited the church and seen the beautiful tile floor. But we choose to do more to help the recovery effort.

During our Lenten Appeal this year 2007, we participated in "Adopt-a-House/Rebuild-a-Home" through Catholic Charities of the Archdiocese of New Orleans. Each week we read the story of Rowena Duplissis, and we raised \$24,237 to help in the rebuilding of her home and others. It is important to realize that for legal reasons the money does not go directly or only to her but instead is used to help any of the homeowners who are ready to proceed with building through Catholic Charities. At this time, Ms. Duplessis has not received any money from the federal or state government and cannot yet proceed with rebuilding because the money from Catholic Charities is only part of all that is needed. Last month Ms. Duplessis was featured in USA Today as facing difficulties but remaining hopeful. We followed up with Catholic Charities and can confirm that they remain committed to helping her when she is ready. We will keep you informed of her situation.

What then has happened with the money raised by St. Francis for Adopt-a-Home? One of our parishioners visited New Orleans in May 2007 and was taken on a tour by Catholic Charities to see what our money is accomplishing. In July, we published in the St. Francis Parish FORUM and in the CANTICLE a progress report with photos about Ms. Doris Aubry's home and others helped by Catholic Charities New Orleans using funds, which include the \$24,237.20, collected and donated by St. Francis Parish members. (Funding to-date for the program at Catholic Charities New Orleans is about \$2 million dollars from all sources including individuals, groups, churches, foundations, corporations and businesses, and CCUSA.) To date, seven homes have been completed. Nine more are under construction. Five are under contract, and four more are being worked on by groups of volunteers. 170 homeowners are in various stages of working with Catholic Charities. When our next group of "GOING SOUTH" volunteers



goes to New Orleans in 2008 to help with clean-up and rebuilding, we will again ask to see first hand what our money has accomplished. We will meet with Catholic Charities, and we will visit homes that have been completed and are under construction. The

pace of reconstruction and recovery seems so slow to those of us who are not there all the time; how must it feel to live with it everyday? Perhaps the words of the poet Henry Wadsworth Longfellow are appropriate:

Though the mills of God grind slowly,
Yet they grind exceeding small;
Though with patience he stands waiting,
With exactness grinds he all.

Take heed now; for the Lord hath chosen thee to build a house for the sanctuary: be strong and do [it]. 1Chronicles 28:10

Tax Program 2007: another tremendous success!

The Tax Assistance Program at St. Francis of Assisi saw approximately 80 clients this year. We estimate that we helped return over \$40,000 to the greater Ann Arbor area.

Comments from clients included: "Now I can fix my car." "Now I can pay for tuition." "You are doing such a wonderful service." Several clients also made donations to our parish, which touched our hearts since these people were giving from their minimal income, not their wealth.



Tax refunds have a ripple effect throughout the economy especially in these economically challenging times. So our service in this program makes a great impact and is very important to our community. A tax refund for someone who is living on social security or minimum wage is a big part of his or her annual household income. Many of our clients cannot afford to go to a company, which charges a fee to prepare taxes. Volunteers from our parish help prepare the various Federal and State tax returns and associated schedules.

Business Manager's Report to the Parish



Since my last report to you in February, we have continued to work on many improvement or repair projects here at St. Francis. Summertime is the primary season for taking on these projects, both from the perspective of fewer people being around to be affected by the disruptions, and from the standpoint of the Parish knowing how much money remains available at the end of the fiscal year to commit to such projects. Our needs are many, but the resources are limited, so we need to prioritize our projects, and begin them only when we are comfortable that we will have the resources to bring them to completion.

This summer, a number of projects were completed that are visible to all parishioners. The largest project was the replacement of the roof on the PAC (the old roof was the original one, dating from 1982). Projects in and around the Church included the replacement of the drinking fountain in the lower hallway of the Church, installation of a new sculpture in the Memorial Garden (donated by a parishioner), and the refinishing and resealing of the exterior wood doors of the Church and PAC.

In the School, the main entry hallway and the hallway to the PAC were both redecorated, with some artistic additions, and chalkboards in all classrooms have been replaced with whiteboards. In addition, several safety improvements have been made to playgrounds used by younger students, including changes in equipment, the replacement of wood mulch with new rubber mulch, and the addition of fences around the green playground. New overhead projection systems also were added to classrooms in five different grade levels. School Development funds provided the bulk of the money necessary to complete these projects.

Finally, in our continuing efforts to create a "home" for our Youth Group and Young Adults, the rectory basement meeting rooms have been renovated to create a new Youth Room, specifically designed for their meetings and events. A small kitchenette was added, thanks to the generosity of a parish family. Meetings which were previously held in the Rectory Basement on a regular basis will, in most cases, be shifted to other meeting rooms for the coming year.

Ye continue to work through our "list" of capital improvement projects but, in a parish as large as ours, there never seems to be an end to the list. Items that we anticipate will need attention in the future, in no particular order, include repair and resurfacing of parking lots, replacement of inefficient windows/doors in the handful of locations not already done, replacement of the Middle School roof, replacement of a problem HVAC system in the Parish Office, and brick repair/tuckpointing on the Bell Tower and the PAC. Those of you who have been around for a number of years I hope would agree that our Parish looks more attractive than ever; I was cheered recently when a high school senior, who is a St. Francis School graduate, happened to be in the School and commented how different, and how much better, it looks than it did just four years ago.

This progress would not be possible without your continuing support. Thank you all for that support. And, as always, please feel free to call or e-mail me.

ail Ministry: Catholic Religious Services at the Washtenaw County Jail





The Sacraments of Initiation: Baptism, Confirmation, and First Holy Eucharist have been celebrated at the jail with a total of seven persons this year (59 persons total, since 2002) being welcomed into full communion with the Catholic Church.

Men and women in the Washtenaw County Jail, wounded, hurting and in need of spiritual healing, experience Catholic community with more than a couple dozen volunteers who participate in Catholic Mass, Eucharistic adoration, and Catholic inquiry class. The inmates are ostracized from ordinary life on trial in jail, and they are seeking the Lord Jesus who alone can reconcile and make new.

Each week on three different days, a group of at least six Catholic volunteers from our parish and other Catholic parishes, visit the jail together. Volunteers serve as often as they like: once a week, once a month, or several times a year. Some volunteers never enter the jail facility, but they support the ministry by helping with projects such as: Writing letters as a Pen Pal; Donating \$5 for a Bible or Catechism; Praying for and encouraging the families of those in jail; and welcoming those released to Sunday Mass and other groups to meet supportive new friends. Wow, what news! We received plenty of items for the household item collection in June. Thank you for your generosity. We organized a youth soccer program with the children and our kids had a great time. The story hour has been going well. The children enjoy a variety of books, which were donated. They swap the books from week to week. The kids love it!

St. Francis Parish volunteers organize projects to show some hospitality and to get to know better the migrant farm workers in our area. A big thank you to our volunteer coordinators: Barb Pomey, Ramona, Kate Wolbert, and Hilary Givens.

Nearly 200 migrant workers and their families come to Du Russel farm, Manchester, Michigan, to farm 2,000 acres from May through October. Each year along with 10 varieties of potatoes, they grow many other vegetable crops, such as peppers, cilantro, parsley, dill, sweet corn, cucumbers, mustard, collard and turnip greens and arugula. They plant radishes every two days during the summer, so that there is a fresh crop every three weeks. Spinach is a new crop the DuRussels are growing. They





began planting a few acres of it three years ago. In 2006, they grew 1,000 tons of spinach, and this year they are planning to grow 2,000 tons. They send it to Campbell's for its V-8 Juice.

The DuRussel family members are long-time active Catholics who employ and advocate for migrant workers in Michigan. Mike DuRussel was recently named to the National Policy Board for Migrant Health, a division of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. He meets with the board, and travels to other parts of the country that employ migrant workers, such as Texas and California.
