## World Youth Day 2008 Sydney, Australia

Just a few weeks ago, 24 youth and young adults from St. Francis journeyed to Australia for the World Youth Day event. This pilgrimage took us to St. Bede's in Melbourne where we spent several days living in the homes of generous hosts. Then it was yet another flight to Sydney so we could participate in the week long set of events known as World Youth Day.

At the WYD events, we heard bishops speak at catechetical sessions, an opening Mass with over 150,000 people, the papal boat-ade, the incredible living Stations of the Cross, and then finally the overnight vigil and closing Mass with Pope Benedict XVI.



Though we began the week as relative strangers, many friendships were forged in our group and with people from around the world. One of the challenging parts of the pilgrimage was the weather—it is winter in Australia. The temperatures were very chilly in Melbourne. While warmer in Sydney, at night it got quite cold. During the overnight vigil, the temperature dropped to 46 degrees.

## A GALLUP SURVEY FOR OUR PARISH

As we draw closer to the second decade of the 21<sup>st</sup> century, our Parish Pastoral Council is beginning work on a new Pastoral Plan for St. Francis of Assisi Parish.

One of our first steps is to hear from each of you. To this end, in October we will be conducting the Gallup ME25 survey, a census of all adult members of our parish. The ME25 will give you the opportunity to share your opinions on some of the critical areas of parish life.

The survey will be administered by Gallup, an independent research company known for its understanding of people and their opinions. Although most of us know them for their polling work, they have been listening to people and studying successful organizations for more than 40 years. With this they bring a seasoned capability to assist us in our effort to gather and understand all of the opinions throughout our parish.

Your opinions will be completely confidential; Gallup will not reveal any individual responses to anyone. After we've received the results back from Gallup, we will use them to move forward in developing our Pastoral Plan.

The success of this effort hinges on the completion of the survey by each one of us who is at least 18 years of age. To this end, we will be asking you to fill out the survey during the weekend Masses of October 18-19<sup>th</sup> (it only takes 5 minutes). Those who will not be present at Mass that weekend, will be able to fill it out "on line" from October 17<sup>th</sup> through November 10<sup>th</sup>.

This is an exciting time for our parish - we are taking important steps to fulfill God's purpose for us both now and in the years to come. We encourage you, when the time comes, to take a few moments and fill out the Gallup ME25 Survey

### Stephen Ministry News . . .

The newest member of our parish Stephen Leadership Team is **Connie Berry**. In August, Connie participated in the week-long "Leader's Training Course" for Stephen Leaders, held in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.



The Stephen Series at our parish has been administered by trained & commissioned **Stephen Leaders** through our parish Social Ministry Office, since 2006. To date, 10 Stephen Leaders (5 female; 5 male) have been trained for service. And, currently we have 8 active Stephen Leaders (3 female, 4 male).

Our parish has trained & commissioned 20 **Stephen Ministers** (11 female, 9 male) since 2006, to provide distinctively Christian care, serving as good listeners and companions for parish members who ask. Currently we have 13 active Stephen Ministers (6 female, 7 male).

Since 2006, we have served 28 care receivers (15 female, 9 male) with a personal one-on-one meeting for one-hour each week. Currently 13 care receivers are being served (7 female, 6 male). **Stephen Ministry is a confidential ministry: The identity of those receiving care and what takes place in each caring relationship remains private.**

We pray for God's blessing upon our Stephen Ministers and especially upon the persons with whom they care. 

## V isiting those in Prison . . . "I can see! I can see!"

Last week, one of the women inmates was really on my heart. Her name is Anne and she's my age. I just knew that God wanted me to pray in particular for her.

Last Friday evening, I visited Anne, one-on-one. She always looks like her eyes hurt. When I asked her about it, she said her glasses are in "her property" (box) because they are broken. She hoped to take them to get them fixed. She said she is blind without her glasses, so I said, "So am I! Try mine on." She did, and was very surprised that they worked for her. At that point, I was just goofing around.

We talked about the fact that she would be released soon, and she has a spot reserved at a homeless shelter in Ann Arbor. She is afraid that instead of trying to get herself to the shelter, she'll just walk back down to her "bad past" because it is easier. As she was speaking, I was thinking that it will be very difficult for her to find that homeless shelter when she can't even see. (I know, because I have terrible eyes, and I could not cross a street safely without my contacts or glasses, let alone read street signs or numbers on a bus.)

She mentioned she got her glasses at particular vision center. So, Saturday afternoon I went to the vision center to see how much it would cost to get another pair of glasses made for her. At the same time, it seemed crazy to me, because I could not afford to buy them. But, really, the Lord kept nudging me in that direction. I told a bit of her story to the man behind the counter at the vision center. He looked Anne up and found her information in the computer. He was very kind and interested in helping, but he said he's not permitted (by law) to make a new pair for her because she hasn't had a recent eye exam.

At that point, I remembered that I had an old pair of glasses at home and that Friday night at the jail, my own glasses helped her vision when she tried them on. I told that to him and asked if my old glasses might

work for her. He told me to bring them in, and he would compare them to her prescription. I ran home and went back to the vision center with my old glasses.

He took my glasses back into the lab and figured out what their prescription was and compared them to the information he had on the computer for Anne. He was amazed. He said there are charitable programs where people donate old glasses, and those glasses are matched to the eyes of needy people. He said he had never seen such a close match as between her eyes and my old glasses, and that anyone getting second-hand glasses would be lucky to have such a match. He said it was the best possible match. He was just amazed, and he gave me a nice, new eyeglass case for her. He even took the time to replace the nosepieces so she would have new ones!

After consulting with our ministry team leader, I went to the jail on Sunday evening and asked to see Anne one-on-one. When the officer brought her down, I had Anne go in the room alone, and then told the officer I had a question for her. I had prayed beforehand, she was one of the officers I would get because she is very kind and generous. In private, I gave the officer the complete story and asked if Anne could have the glasses.

The officer was wonderful! She was more than happy to help. She took the glasses down to medical, got them okayed, and then brought them back to Anne and me in the one-on-one room. I hadn't told Anne a thing, because I didn't want to get her hopes up in case the jail wouldn't let her have them.

She tried them on and they worked great! She kept saying, "I can see! I can see!" She is very excited to start a new life with her glasses. She thinks she'll get out on Tuesday, so pray for her! She is very touched that God has provided this for her and she KNOWS that He loves her. It has given her a great deal of confidence.

## Business Manager's Report to the Parish



### AUGUST 2008:

Since my last report to you in February, we have continued to work on many improvement or repair projects here at St. Francis. Summertime is the primary season for taking on these projects, both from the perspective of fewer people being around to be affected by the disruptions, and from the standpoint of the Parish knowing how much money remains available at the end of the fiscal year to commit to such projects. Our needs are many, but the resources are limited, so we need to prioritize our projects, and begin them only when we are comfortable that we will have the resources to bring them to completion.

This summer, a number of projects were completed that are visible to all parishioners. The largest project was the extensive repair and resurfacing of parking lots. It had been five years since any significant work had been done on the lots, and they were beginning to show signs of deterioration. This summer's work should give us several more years of service from the lots. Original single-pane windows in the Chapel and the Sacristy of the Church were also replaced with energy-efficient, low-maintenance dual-pane windows, and the Church was rewired to provide access to state-of-the-art T-coil hearing aid systems, as well as to facilitate the live-streaming of Masses to begin this fall. We also had to address a problem with groundwater leaking into an underground storage area on the lower level of the Church.

In the School, the largest project involved replacement of fifty-year old electrical panels, breakers, and wiring in order to bring more power into the classrooms. School Development efforts have provided much new technology to the School, but we have on occasion not been able to benefit from

all of it due to power constraints. Following this year's upgrades, this should no longer be a problem. Repainting/redecorating of the 2<sup>nd</sup>/3<sup>rd</sup> grade hallway and the entrance area around the K/1 entrance, along with three sets of stairs, also was completed, in a style to match the redesign work done in the front entrance and 4<sup>th</sup>/5<sup>th</sup> grade hallway last year. In addition, a new electronic security system was added to the main entrance doors of the School, and doors and windows at two of the buildings' entrances (K/1 and 2/3) were also replaced with new energy-efficient steel doors and windows. The red playground in front of the School, where the fitness trail is located, was also upgraded with new rubber mulch to match the other playgrounds around the School.

We continue to work through our "list" of capital improvement projects but, in a parish as large as ours, there never seems to be an end to the list. Items that we anticipate will need attention in the future, in no particular order, include replacement of inefficient windows/doors in the handful of locations not already done, replacement of the Middle School roof, replacement of old back-up hot water and steam boilers servicing the Church and School, addition of a supplemental HVAC system for the Gym, and brick repair/tuckpointing on the Bell Tower, Parish Office, and the PAC. Those of you who have been around for a number of years I hope would agree that our Parish looks more attractive than ever.

This progress would not be possible without your continuing support. Thank you all for that support. And, as always, please feel free to call or e-mail me should you have any questions or comments.
