Atholics Returning Home

Most of us do not have to look very far to find non-practicing Catholics in our circle of family and friends. Many people can't explain why they stopped coming to church except that life just got in the way. Some inactive Catholics bear a tremendous amount of guilt, legitimate anger, or misinformation; but they are afraid of rejection if they approach the Church.

Our Catholics Returning Home program focuses on facilitating the return of Catholics who for whatever reason and for whatever length of time, have become inactive in the Church. Through participation in this program, the men and women take responsibility for reflecting on their faith journey. Various parishioners, who themselves had left and returned, help these people through the process. In a comfortable, casual, confidential setting, the group gathers for prayer, faith sharing and instruction.

Once the first step back is taken, these people feel as if they have returned to a God who had been waiting for them all along.

Finding God In Troubled Times


Parish Mini-Mission: hosts author

After hearing him preach at all the weekend masses, hundreds gathered in church Sunday night, March 8th to hear Richard Hauser, S.J. share his thoughts about finding God in times of suffering. So often our initial reaction is to question where God is in our times of trouble, threatening our faith and our very foundation. Using scripture and personal stories Fr. Hauser reflected



on God's Presence in strength and love accompanying us through our difficulties, a comforting thought as these troubled times continue.

Following his talk Fr. Hauser conversed with attendees individually about their struggles as well as signed copies of his book, <u>Finding God in Troubled Times</u>, which was



available for Richard purchase. Hauser. S.J. is Rector of the Jesuit Community, Professor of Theology and Director of the Masters of Arts in Christian Spirituality Program Creighton a t University.

From Stress to Serenity

When hit with life disrupting change, it is important to acknowledge the effect the event has on your life, decide how you want to emerge from the disruption, and allow time for the process to unfold. Given our stressful times it

might be good for all of us to reflect on some strategies to facilitate transition and decrease stress in our lives:

- Gain self knowledge
- Do not blame others
- Accept that life is not fair
- Develop a regular practice of meditation and/or prayer
- Optimize your physical health
- Write about your problems and the feelings associated with them
- Make a list of the positive experiences in your life right now

St. Francis School's year-long fundraiser for Home of Hope Orphange in India culminated at the end of April with a visit from Sister Sophy Joseph, a nun with the Salesian sister of Don Bosco from the orphanage, and Paul Wilkes, their U.S. Coordinator. Home of Hope houses 67 destitute girls who have been abused or abandoned. Two years ago, Mr.

Wilkes visited St. Francis and our parishioners dug into their pockets and raised \$25,000 to help build a new three-story facility for the orphanage.

For the 2008-2009 school year St. Francis School decided to sponsor a year-long service project to create a "Field of

Dreams" in what is now a swamp. This *Field of Dreams* will include a brand new playground and grassy area, a much needed play space for the girls. Throughout the year, students have had the opportunity once a month to bring in \$1.00 for an optional dress down day, with all proceeds going to Home of Hope. In January,

the 3rd and 5th grades sponsored a Children's Used Book Sale. Parishioners and school families donated gently used books to this sale which generated a total of \$1,400! In February, the 4th and 6th grades sponsored a Chocolate Valentine Airplane Sale, this fundraiser generated around \$1,250 for Home of Hope!



The check that was presented to Sister Sophy and Mr. Wilkes on April 29th was for \$6,614; however, St. Francis School is not done yet! The 2nd and 7th grades sponsored a Car Wash on May 20th and raised \$571! For the last big fundraiser, parents of St. Francis students will sponsor the Adult Summer Reading List Sale, a sale of gently used adult fiction and nonfiction books, on May 31st

after Masses and June 1st after school.

During Sister Sophy's visit, the whole school held a



prayer service. The Middle School Choir sang, students read special prayers, and Sister Sophy and Paul Wilkes presented a slideshow of pictures of the orphanage, explaining to our students what life at Home of Hope was like. There were few dry eyes in the church during this service and many students were inspired to hopefully visit Home of Hope in the future. After the service, Sister Sophy

and Mr. Wilkes visited each classroom individually and students presented them gifts to take to the girls at the orphanage.

Construction on the *Field of Dreams* playground should begin before the rainy season comes to India later this summer. Our students and staff cannot wait to see pictures of the girls enjoying their new outdoor play area!

Members St. Francis of Assisi participated in the **Rebuilding Together** national "Day of Rebuilding" on Saturday, April 25, 2009.

Rebuilding Together is a national nonprofit organization with the mission of preserving safe and affordable housing by bringing together volunteers, building professionals and donated materials to repair and rehabilitate the homes of low-income, elderly and physically challenged homeowners. This work is

provided at no cost to the homeowners. Nationwide, an estimated 10,000 homes were renovated in over two hundred locations this year.

In Ann Arbor and Ypsilanti, the lives of fourteen homeowners were improved by nearly two hundred volunteers. Members of St. Francis of Assisi and St. Mary Student Parish of Ann Arbor, and St. John the Baptist and Transfiguration parishes of Ypsilanti participated on various homes that day. Completed tasks included construction of a wheelchair ramp, exterior door and lockset replacements, roof repairs, electrical repairs,

t. Francis Tax Assistance Program 2009

This year we prepared approximately 73 sets of tax returns resulting in close to \$103,000 in net refunds to our clients. As you all know, tax refunds act as a stimulus to the economy because many times people use their refunds to purchase items that they would normally not purchase otherwise. This year due to the poor economy, many of our clients are now living on reduced incomes as a result of pay decreases or loss of employment, so these refunds are even more important as they will provide additional cash flow for household expenses. Whatever the use our clients will put these refunds to, the result will surely help them and perhaps provide a small boost to the economy in the greater Ann Arbor area.

Business Manager's Report to the Parish

In my most recent report to you last November, I told you about the upgrades to our electrical infrastructure throughout the School, Parish Offices, and PAC. That work has now been finished, including upgrading outdoor lighting around the School and Church, and the flood light on the Bell Tower. We are realizing improved lighting, almost 100% reliability, extended bulb life, and even somewhat lower electrical use, so it has been a win-

win situation. There have been the usual other maintenance problems common to any facility our size, which have been addressed as necessary. These types of things include clearing drain or sewer lines, and replacing hinges and pivots and the Church doors.

As you can see, there have been no new major projects begun, owing primarily to our concern about local economic trends and their impact on our revenues (i.e. Sunday collections); as an example of this, we have postponed the previously anticipated replacement of back-up hot water and steam boilers, and the re-programming of controls to take advantage of the newer, more efficient boilers. Not that these are not worthwhile projects, but we have become much more cautious given local economic concerns. I might note that, by the time you read this, we expect that we will have been successful in locking up our natural gas supply for the next two winters on a fixed-price basis that will be at least 20% less than our current discounted fixed rate. Even with the long, harsh winter of 2008-09, our gas/heating expenses did not increase over the prior year, and we would expect, with more normal winters, we would begin to see significant cash savings in energy use.

Our summertime projects for 2009 number only two or three, but they include a couple of major items. First and foremost is the anticipated replacement of the Church roof. As most of you are already aware, we have been experiencing an increase in water leaks from the Church roof, and some have become so troublesome that they have knocked out certain components of the Church sound system. Our Parish Finance Council has supported the replacement of the roof to solve these problems (which regular repairs have been unable to solve), and we expect that this work will begin in June or July. Although the work will be costly, it will be funded out of funds from the Thomas and Shirley Taylor bequest. Also planned is the renovation/upgrading of restrooms on the K/1 and 2/3 levels of the School. This work will be funded out of Summer Appeal funds raised earlier this fiscal year. We also expect to add secured storage space of some sort in our 4th and 5th grade classrooms.


> Projects which remain on our "to do" list continue to include, in no particular order, the replacement of inefficient windows/doors in the handful of locations not already done; brick repair/tuckpointing on the Bell Tower, Parish Office, and PAC; addition of a supplemental HVAC system for the Gym; replacement of the Middle School roof; and renovating/upgrading school restrooms on the 4/5 and Middle School levels. Although it


was not a project of the Parish, we should note, because it would have affected many people coming to the Parish, that the City of Ann Arbor has informed us that it has postponed the previously scheduled curb, sidewalk, and street repairs to St. Francis Drive between East Stadium Boulevard and Nature Cove Court, presumably due to financial concerns. This work is now anticipated to occur during the summer of 2010.

We appreciate very much your continued support of the Parish and School during these relatively difficult times. Although the pace of project work may seem less in the coming year, rest assured that we are proceeding to take care of whatever needs immediate attention, so that we do not have more ground to make up when the economy eventually turns around, as we expect that it will.
