and John Hamil, Sandy and Dave Harrison, Wanita and Celia Forgacs, and David Kieras.




Serving with Franciscans for the Poor

Business Manager's Report to the Parish

As this is written, summer vacation is about over, and a number of major Parish projects, along with some smaller ones, are winding up. The largest project of the summer, but one which is not very visible, was the replacement of the Middle School roof. Work began in June and was completed in July, just prior to the opening of Vacation Bible School. The roof that was replaced was twenty-seven years old, and although no leaks had occurred, we wanted to upgrade this roof before any problems materialized. Following this replacement, only the roof on the Gym (1990) dates from prior to the 1994 renovation of the School and Rectory.

A second major project undertaken this summer, and one which is highly visible, was the rehabilitation of the main storm water detention pond located in front of the Church, along with the removal of the row of junipers (thank you Brian Biggs!) and the clearing of both sanitary and storm sewer lines. The heavy rains of May and June produced a number of storm water back-ups, indicating that drainage was seriously obstructed. The removal of the large willow tree west of the main parking lot entrance from Stadium Boulevard was part of this work. Although some work remains to be done before September, we believe that the problems will be solved upon its completion.

Another major project, and one which was not expected, was the replacement of water lines serving the 2nd/3rd grade drinking fountain and restrooms in the School. The original pipes were made of galvanized metal (sixty years ago copper was too expensive, and PVC had not yet been invented), and with age, they corrode and develop leaks. One such leak occurred above the ceiling of the ESP classroom, with the result that, in addition to replacing the old pipes, we also had to replace the ESP ceiling. If you happen to be in the School building and have the opportunity, you might enjoy taking a look at the new ESP classroom, particularly if you remember it from many years ago!

Replacement concrete work was completed around the Church and PAC in April, and in front of the main doors of the School in July. In addition, on August 25th, we began resurfacing the portion of our main parking lot which was not resurfaced two years ago, and

repairing some other areas showing deterioration. We will also be seal coating and restriping the front lots, with a completion target date of September 1st. As those attending daily Mass or evening activities can attest, we rented out portions of our parking lots on a number of dates in late June and early August to one of the movie companies filming in the Ann Arbor area; those funds, along with money from the Taylor Bequest Fund, will pay for the parking lot repairs.

Also, new steel doors and insulated windows were installed in the School Music Room and the Art Room hallway, replacing wood doors which tended to swell with humidity. All of the entrance/exit doors in the School have now been upgraded, except for the 6th Grade doors and windows, which we hope to replace in the coming year. In addition, new rubber mulch was added to the five playgrounds around the School, used by St. Francis School and Religious Ed students alike; the rubber mulch is more forgiving of accidents than the old woodchip mulch, and does not decompose like wood mulch does. Also, eaves and trim have been painted all around the School and PAC, and we expect the Parish Office eaves and trim will be repainted in early September once the work on the School is complete. Finally, the chain-link fence along Stadium Boulevard and St. Francis Drive was repainted.

As the calendar moves from summer to fall, our capital improvement projects tend to subside, until the need for additional work becomes apparent. This year, given continuing concerns about local economic conditions, we do not anticipate additional projects, at least until next summer, although our "to do" list continues to include, in no particular order, some of the "usual suspects" we have discussed previously: replacing the single-pane, uninsulated doors/windows in the 6th Grade entrance area; improving lighting for Masses in the Church; brick repair/tuckpointing on the Bell Tower, Parish Office, and PAC; addition of a supplemental HVAC system for the Gym; and renovating/upgrading school restrooms on the 4/5 and Middle School levels.
