
Fourth Annual

A spiritual director is someone you can talk with confidentially about your prayer and spiritual life. Because every aspect of your daily life affects your relationship with God, ordinary concerns such as work, family and relationships are shared in spiritual direction. In a direction session, spiritual directors companion you through the aspects of your daily life, helping you listen for the Holy Spirit within, noticing God's presence in your life and discerning God' will for you.

elp the Homeless—Buy a Paper!

Reprinted from the May 2011 edition of Groundcover News, a newspaper that creates opportunities and a voice for low-income people while taking action to end homelessness and poverty. In the article "A Perfect Ten," Groundcover vendor Rissa Haynes writes of being grateful to the gracious and generous members of St. Francis. She makes reference to a sweet, young girl who touched her heart on a difficult day. (That young girl is our beloved 4th grader, Faith Fosdick!)

The number 10 has taken on some Significant meanings. In various competitions, the number 10 is the perfect score; in the Bible it is the number for completion; for me it has been astonishingly a sign of great compassion, love and gracious generosity.



My past sales motivators have suggested we never give up until after the 10th "No, Thank You." This has proven to be a very helpful tip for "sticking and staying" while working "my corner" in front of the Food Co-op in Kerrytown. Surprisingly, though, I've never had to count all the way up to 10 before some compassionate patron would come to buy a Groundcover newspaper. Some people even buy several copies of the same issue, just to help my business.

On one occasion, I was working a concert at the "churple" -- an Episcopal Church & Jewish Temple - and several circumstantial obstacles had prevented my timely arrival. Cold, tattered and worn, I set up my vending area late. After the 9th no thank you passed by, another sweet, young lady approached me with outstretched arms and a \$10 bill in her palm. As I looked up into her eyes to ask how many papers she wanted to buy, I recognized her as a former Groundcover vendor. She was attending the concert before moving out of town. "This is for you!" she said warmly with a smile. We hugged before she went into the churple. OH WHAT BROTHERLY LOVE!

On the first Saturday and Sunday of each month, a group of us vendors sell papers at St. Francis Catholic Church. The parishioners there have consistently been very gracious and generous in their support of our Groundcover venture. Not only are we greeted by assigned volunteers who truly make me feel welcome, but also the members of the congregation donate generously to our business.

I recall one Sunday feeling like the cripple who laid by the Pool of Bethesda (see story in Bible St. John 5:2ff), not being able to get into the pool fast enough for the healing, because others quicker than himself would get in before him. My mobility challenge had me in a similar position where the other vendors were greeting the members of the church, before they got to *my* area. As I stood there having a bit of a "pity party," a sweet, young girl (probably 4th or 5th-grader) came to me and gave me 10 dollars, "We already have the paper," she said. "This is for you." Such gracious generosity made my heart and eyes swell with warm waters that healed my pity party and turned it into an attitude of gratitude.

EASTER VIGIL 2011 ... We welcome our new members!





The apex of the Rite of Christian Initiation occurs on Holy Saturday at the Easter Vigil when the Elect (unbaptized) are fully initiated into the Catholic Church through the sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist; and the Candidates (already baptized) are received into full communion with the Catholic Church through Profession of Faith, Confirmation, and Eucharist.

ax Program Brings Strangers Together!

This year we were able to meet with **over 100 clients** and prepare tax returns totaling **over \$159,000 in refunds**. This refund amount is **up 9% from last year's** program and we saw **a 20% increase in clients**. Truly incredible!

Many people do not file tax returns because they are not aware of the many credits available or do not know how to fill out the forms. The IRS recently announced that an estimated \$1.1 billion in federal tax refunds will go unclaimed for 2007 if returns are not filed by April 18th. Much of this is from low income people who felt they did not have enough income to file, even though they had taxes withheld from their wages and were eligible for some tax credits. However, programs like the tax assistance program at St. Francis help get these refunds to those in the greatest need. The refunds generated by this program will help our clients in many ways, from paying for household expenses to perhaps saving for the future.

We served many people, yet, a couple of people come to mind. One gentleman came in on one of the last days of the program. He had fully expected to owe federal and state taxes due to a penalty for cashing out his retirement account early. After spending some extra time with him and having him obtain some additional information, we were able to lower the amount he owed on his Federal taxes to a minimal amount and he ended up

getting a state refund. He stopped by this past weekend to thank us once again for the help and even

brought some fresh baked cookies. He also told me that he hopes to make a donation to the church once he receives his refund. It never ceases to amaze me that despite experiencing tough times, people are willing to give from their hearts, not their surpluses.

We also helped prepare 3 years worth of taxes for the elderly mother of one of our longtime clients. This woman had been told by a paid tax preparer that she did not need to file any taxes because she did not owe anything at the federal level. However she was unaware that she was eligible for the Michigan property tax credit and once we completed the 3 years of returns, she netted a refund of about \$700. These 2 stories, and many others like them, demonstrate the need for quality tax preparation and are why this program continues to be so important in our community.

This year we welcomed several new volunteers: Crystal, Carolyn, Andrew and Alexandra. We also welcomed back several volunteers to the program: Lisa, Ralph, Brad, Kathy, Lynn M., Greg, Lynn S., and Deisy. Have a great year!!! ~ *Julie M. Soyer*, Tax Program Coordinator.


St. Francis of Assisi Catholic School **Educational Trust Fund**

The Educational Trust Fund (ETF) was established in 1987 to help secure the future of St. Francis of Assisi Catholic School.

10th Annual ETF Benefit - A Great Success!

The 10th annual Benefit on March 5th was a great success. The high energy created by 264 guests lasted the whole night. Fr. Jim almost won the Heads & Tails game. The fun, competitive bidding in the live auction led to all-time highs including the "Teacher's Dinner" that went for a record \$3,250. Every silent auction item went home with someone! Later, the band had the dance floor packed song after song. It was a night to remember and in the end, over \$52,000 was raised in net proceeds for the **Educational Trust Fund**.

Moreover, during the event, many guests contributed an additional \$46,400 to a special *Tuition Assistance Appeal* to help students attend St. Francis of Assisi Catholic School.

NEW: ETF Leadership Circle - has tremendous start!

In addition to the annual ETF Benefit, a new program is now in place to help ensure the consistent growth of the Trust Fund over time. The year 2011 marks the launch of the "ETF Leadership Circle," which is comprised of individuals who commit a minimum of \$1,000 annually to the Trust Fund for 5 years. To date, 27 families have joined the 2011 ETF Leadership Circle and committed a total of \$195,000 to the Trust Fund over the next 5 years. It's a tremendous start and we will continue to build the Leadership Circle in the years to come.

As the Trust Fund grows, so does the annual award to the school. (The award is used for operating costs.) In accordance with the terms of the Trust document, each year five percent of the average of the last three years' beginning fund balance is disbursed to St. Francis of Assisi Catholic School - the most recent distribution being \$52,000. As of April 30, 2011, the balance of the Trust Fund totaled \$1,213,167.
