Teens' Summer Service

This summer the high school youth ministry headed to locales near and far to serve and to learn more of the Church's social justice teaching.



Destination: Wisconsin

Things began with a trip to Green Bay, Wisconsin. Heading out just after school finished, a group of teens arrived at the home of the Packers and cheese curds, for a week of service and learning, centered around environmental stewardship and care for the earth.

This unique service trip allowed the teens to work with the Oneida Nation on their organic, sustainable, teaching farm. As the teens planted vegetables, shelled dried corn. weeded, fed cows and

generally got their hands dirty, they learned the traditions of the Oneida people and how they view the call **to live sustainably** and also **ensure that all have sufficient resources**. One afternoon a tribe elder even gave a *wild craft tour* where the teens learned what various native plants can be used for if one is stung by a bee, gets a cut, or needs a calming tea.

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Destination: Guatemala

Later in the summer, another group of teens headed off to a very different service trip. This group braved the required vaccines and long preparations so they could help with the Francisco Coll School and Santa Clara Nursery run by International



Samaritan in Guatemala City. This school and nursery are particularly special and in need of support as they are for the garbage dump community's children.

The teens on the trip helped construct a roof of cement over two classrooms in addition to weeding and removing bushes and vines from the garden area. They also had the opportunity to spend time in the classrooms and nursery rooms. After a

hard week of work, the weekend tours of Lake Atitlan and Antigua were a welcome break.

JESUS: What's With All the Names?



This summer we were pleased to have our seminarian intern, Gary Koenigsknecht, deliver a series of talks on three of the names of Jesus. First week, we learned *The Great Story of the Bible: God is with us!* Through visual presentation, lecture, Scripture passages

from both the Old and New Testaments, and table discussion, attendees learned that God's presence with His people is evidenced not just in the New Testament stories that begin with Jesus' birth, but since the very beginning of creation.

Next up, Gary enlightened the group as regards prophets—those who speak in the name of God under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit. We learned the five basic characteristics of a biblical prophet and Gary went on to discuss how Jesus fulfills all five of these. The bigger challenge this evening was to gain a better understanding of how we are to put our call to be prophet today into practice.

On the third evening, Gary told of four specific obligations of a redeemer with examples from the Old Testament. He then looked at Christ the Redeemer through selected Scripture passages. Finally he engaged us in table discussion of "do we live like we have been redeemed" and "do we redeem those around us through our prayers and actions". God's grace, the free cooperation of the individuals, the action of the Church and the circumstances of time and place" (RCIA, 5).

Many times people come during Lent or just after celebrating Easter

with us. They are caught up in our liturgies and want to discern if Catholicism is right for them. Rather than telling them "we begin in September come back then", St. Francis Parish offers a spring-summer



series of meetings with those interested in becoming Catholic.

The group met during June and July in a relaxed atmosphere of prayer, Scripture, video presentation, and questions & answers. We took a break in August, and will begin again for weekly sessions in September.

If you know someone who is interested in becoming Catholic, invite them to explore the RCIA at St. Francis. It takes many parishioners to help bring the faith alive for these individuals. 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

The Butman family furnished the Grand Prize, as they have always done, but set a goal of \$100,000 to be raised by the Raffle. This represents just more than a 40% increase from the previous few years. They ordered from the factory a fully-loaded, cherry red Mustang convertible just to serve as our Grand

Prize.

Thanks to the parishioners at St. Francis of Assisi Church, the residents at IHN Alpha House had great meals and more than seven hours of supervised playtime during the week of May 28 through June Forty-seven 3. volunteers, including 12 kids ages 9-17, provided approximately 150 hours of service to this homeless shelter for families.

Why give food away when there are needy here?

Most of our efforts, especially our meal and grocery efforts are to help struggling people here at home. Every week of the year, all year long, members of St. Francis Parish bring non-perishable food items to Mass that are delivered by volunteers to local pantries: the Northside Community Center of Catholic Social Services in Ann Arbor; and Hope Center in Ypsilanti.

Also, two major drives each year are organized just for people in Washtenaw County. In November the Sunday before Thanksgiving and in February during Lent, we deliver to pantries in Ann Arbor and Ypsilanti.

Efforts beyond, Washtenaw County—traditionally in June each year, we partner with our sister parish in Detroit to help with the youth camp program by delivering our groceries to them.

Congratulations and thank you to all parishioners who participated in our <u>June/summer 2012 Food Drive</u>. Once again your generosity for the Food Drive was amazing! On behalf of Corpus Christi Parish and the children and families served with the food that you donated, thank you!

We collected and delivered 330 bags of groceries to our sister parish, Corpus Christi Parish for use at their children's summer camp. Migrant Ministry August 2012 at Du Russell Farm

St. Francis of Assisi volunteers are making August a little more interesting (for the fourth year in a row) for children living at Du Russell Potato Farm in Manchester. Families come to Du Russell in May/June to plant crops, cultivate them all summer,

then harvest them in August-October. Their elementary-age children have summer school until the end of July and regular school after Labor Day, BUT August is very long for them. They are in daycare with one of the mothers who doesn't work in the fields. During August, we have been going out with books, balls, games, crafts, projects, etc. on Tuesday and Friday mornings, and Wednesday afternoons.

The children are a lot of fun to be with and easily interested in doing things with us. Some have played "chair base" kickball; others have been making stuffed animals. We have made puzzles, heard the book *Dinosaurs Before Dark*, measured the wing span of a Pteranodon (30 feet), made things with Legos, etc. All of the volunteers are wonderful and pitch in to help the children be engaged and have fun. On June 21, St. Francis hosted the 13th annual membership meeting of **Religious Action for Affordable Housing**



(RAAH). RAAH is a nonprofit organization with the mission to work for the substantial increase of affordable housing in Washtenaw County.

RAAH's 4th Capital Campaign raised \$100,000 over two years. Quoting from the President's report: "This campaign was undertaken during a time of financial hardship....but we did not underestimate the power and commitment of the Washtenaw County religious community; they recognized that the need for affordable housing is greater now than ever before. Checks were distributed to Avalon Housing and SOS Community

St. Francis supports: Affordable Housing

Services, fulfilling RAAH's pledge of \$40,000 to each agency. Additionally, a balance at the Ann Arbor Community Foundation allows \$20,000 to be available for urgent needs of nonprofit agencies that provide affordable housing and supportive services.

The designated speaker was Jennifer Hall, Director of the Ann Arbor Housing Commission. She said, "In an ideal world, you can choose the rent you can afford. But in this real estate market, income and rent are no longer related: We are losing affordable housing faster than we can replace it."

Nobody understands this better than the approximately 70 individuals who were living in tents at Camp Take Notice. The State recently evicted the homeless campers. Despite promises of several dozen rental vouchers, only two of the campers have found housing because local landlords do not accept the vouchers that would make an apartment affordable. The struggle for affordable housing in our County continues.

Down On The Farm

Seminarian, Gary Koenigsknecht spent this past summer with us at St. Francis Parish. He invited parishioners to visit his family's organic dairy farm, on a day-long trip to Fowler.



August 8, 2012: 55 parishioners boarded a bus to visit my family's organic dairy farm located north of Lansing. The farm milks 95 cows and sells the milk to Horizon Organic.

We began by going into the milking parlor and observing firsthand how cows are milked!

Next we helped feed calves and saw the laying hens that provide eggs for the family.

We stopped for a lunch prepared by my mother and

foods sent by the Horizon Organic company. After lunch, there was an opportunity for tractor rides, which many of the kids present enjoyed!

I then led a tour of the remainder of the farm, explaining the daily chores, the use of pastures, and how feed is harvested and stored for the winter. We had an



opportunity to explain how organic farming is unique in its treatment of the land and animals, and how my parents work to manage soil fertility through

organic means. Much like we need to eat the right foods to stay healthy, so my parents work hard to give the cows the right nutrition they need to stay healthy.



We finished with Mass celebrated by my uncle, Fr. Bill Koenigsknecht, at the beautiful parish in Fowler. It was a wonderful day to welcome some of St. Francis Parish to the farm and explain how my parents and other organic farms work hard to provide the foods that we buy in the store.
