
In April we enjoyed a **Spring Country Road Trip** to Pious Union of St. Joseph Shrine in Grass Lake for

## Canticle of St. Francis Finance Council Commits Parish to

## nvironmental Action



In September 2011, the Parish Finance Council adopted the following Environmental Policy Statement:

"Our patron Saint, St. Francis of Assisi, believed that nature itself was 'the mirror of God.' He preached the duty of all people 'to protect and enjoy nature as both stewards of God's creation and as creatures ourselves.

"Following the path of our patron, St. Francis of Assisi Parish recognizes that our daily operations impact the environment, and pledges to protect and improve the environment through best practices wherever possible.

"St. Francis of Assisi Parish will work to integrate environmental considerations into our business decisions and to adopt environmentally-friendly alternatives throughout our operations wherever possible."

Following this initial step, a Committee of the Finance Council was formed to focus on Environmental Issues affecting the Parish and its parishioners. This Committee began an intensive review of environmental audits and reviews recently performed by the Washtenaw County Drain Commissioner's Office, the WARM Training Center on behalf of the Michigan Interfaith Power and Light Coalition, and our own Peace and Justice Committee, and supplemented those inputs with an energy audit on the Rectory conducted by an outside environmental contractor in September 2012.

The Committee was pleased to find how much had already been accomplished in the Parish. Virtually all outdated T12 lamps throughout our campus have been replaced with high efficiency T8 fluorescent lamps with electronic ballasts, many incandescent bulbs have been replaced with high efficiency Compact Fluorescent Lamps (CFL's), and interior Exit signs have been changed over to Light

Emitting Diodes (LED's).

Many of our building entrances have had doors and windows replaced to reduce air infiltration and heat loss, most restrooms have been re-equipped with motion sensors on toilets, urinals, and wash stations, and occupancy sensors have been added to all restrooms and maintenance closets. Water heaters are located throughout our buildings near usage points to maximize efficiency, and energy-efficient appliances are purchased whenever we need to replace an appliance.

In November 2012, following the audit of the Rectory, we replaced both the furnace and air conditioning systems, which dated from 1993, with high efficiency units, capturing both energy savings (natural gas and electricity) and rebates from the manufacturer and utility. Solarpowered vent fans, CFL's, water faucet aerators, and foam pipe insulation have also been installed in the Rectory wherever appropriate. We continue to favor products that are recycled or recyclable, or if that is not practical, compostable as in the case of cups used for Coffee and Donuts. We participate in the City of Ann Arbor's Recycling program, generating a full dumpster or more almost every week of the year; large wood items such as pallets are taken to Recycle Ann Arbor, and re-usable items such as desks, chairs, or furniture are given to charities or taken to the Re-Use Store. Compostable waste is delivered to the City's Composting Program.

Finally, the Council expressed its support of continuing efforts within the Parish to improve our environmental

footprint, and to support the efforts of the Sustainability Project established by our Peace and Justice Committee. We encourage all parishioners in their own efforts at achieving Sustainability, and reducing their own demands on the environment shared by all.


# igh School Youth

The concert began with an inspirational Easter processional of boys and bells, followed by selections played by the Assisi Ringers Handbell Choir. The audience joined the Boychoir in singing the Easter hymn, "I know that my Redeemer lives" as the Assisi Ringers rang, and Dr. Strode accompanied on the organ.



The Boychoir mesmerized the audience with a selection of traditional and contemporary favorites, including Schubert's "The Lord is my Shepherd" and "Baba Yetu" by Christopher Tin. ## hank you for Home Repairs

#### **Christmas in Action 2013**

Nearly thirty members of St. Francis of Assisi improved the life of a homeowner by participating in the Christmas in Action "Day of Action" on Saturday, April 27th 2013, rehabilitating a home in Ypsilanti Township.

Christmas in Action is a national nonprofit organization with the mission of preserving safe and affordable housing for low-income, elderly and physically-challenged homeowners by bringing together volunteers, building professionals and donated materials to repair and rehabilitate the homes. This work is provided at no cost to the homeowners. Nationwide, hundreds of homes were renovated in dozens of locations this year.

The St. Francis home this year provided many opportunities to improve the homeowner's safety and well-being. The completed tasks included replacement of two badly rotted windows and frames with brand new installations. The bathroom vanity which could not support the sink was completely replaced with a shiny new version. Throughout the home, ungrounded electrical outlets were replaced with safer GFIs. This job required running wiring through an 18 inch high crawlspace! New kitchen cabinet handles replaced broken versions, several faulty light fixtures were replaced, and the ripped dryer vent was replaced with a new version. And on the outside, missing siding was replaced with brand new perfectly matched pieces, and missing gutters and downspouts were replaced to carry rain water away from the house.

Meanwhile, the dedicated landscaping team took advantage of the glorious spring day to transform the yard. Debris and overgrown trees and bushes were removed, and a big hole in the yard was filled with topsoil and seed. And throughout the yard, empty planters and spaces were converted to beautiful beds complete with mulch, edging and flowering perennials. The homeowner, who loves plants and flowers but cannot tend to them daily was thrilled with this fantastic solution.

And on Friday, a dedicated and efficient food crew of twelve parish members prepared and packed breakfast and lunch for ALL the Christmas in Action volunteers in Ann Arbor and Ypsilanti. The volunteers were grateful for the food and snacks during a busy Saturday.

The faculty and students always are excited for the jubilation of summer. It is rewarding to look back and remember an amazing year celebrating our faith and building in knowledge. We wish everyone a


