Along the way we will hear scripture passages retelling the great events surrounding his birth and be joined by such notables as Isaiah the Prophet of hope and consolation, Paul so full of encouragement and challenge, John the Baptist with his ever relevant call to repentance, King David and his openness to God's

forgiveness, and of course Mary and Joseph whose obedience to God's word sets a model for us all.

What a community we will be as we journey together!

May the Christ child be in our hearts this day and always, as we rejoice in his birth and walk in the light of his ways!

Adult Faith Formation

Saint Francis – In the light of the garden statue

Franciscan spirituality is profoundly Christocentric due to Francis' intense devotion to Jesus. He understood fully how far God would go to reach out to every man, woman, and child to enter into relationship with them. The Crib, the Cross, and the Chalice are three key instances of this Divine inbreaking. The humility and poverty which God accepted in becoming incarnate struck Francis in a very personal way. Poverty and obedience are expressions of a loving relationship with Divine Love. Francis yearned to live as Christ had lived. From the helplessness of infancy, through the defenselessness of crucifixion, to the silence of the Eucharist, we too are called to live as Christ in the world.

During the month of October, we celebrated our parish patron with a variety of events. Mark Price returned to Ann Arbor to offer a dramatic portrayal of the life of Saint Francis. We had our traditional animal cookies for Coffee & Donut Hour from Benny's Bakery. Fr. Tom blessed the live pets and animals on the plaza in front of the Church. Our small groups read and discussed *Life Lessons From Saint Francis*—the books very generously discounted by the publisher. Each Monday, different guest speakers presented aspects of the life or works of Saint Francis. We closed our "Francisfest" with Mass on October 31, at which Fr. James blessed and dedicated two new icons of St. Francis and St. Clare for use in our daily chapel.

School of Discipleship

Are you "in the dark" about your faith? Has your light grown dim? How can we show the light of Christ unless we are ourselves formed in the faith?

Formation is more than education. Formation means, **I learn**, in accordance with the gospels, and **respond** in a way that changes my life.

This fall, we reopened the St. Francis School of Discipleship beginning with a 6-week course in Salvation History. Twenty-six people listened and learned under the tutelage of Jim Miller. "The class was illuminating and exciting!" "Jim is a dynamic speaker who is also very knowledgeable."

Watch for our Winter Course offering: Pray All Ways, coming in February. Our Associate Pastor, Fr. Tom, will teach us about prayer and spirituality and the benefits of a good prayer life.

So, What's Next????



Have you ever read the Acts of the Apostles? Acts gives us a close and intimate look into the lives of those first generation Christians, some of whom were eye-witnesses to Jesus' ministry. If they hadn't experienced and seen the physical Jesus for themselves, they most likely came to believe through the testimony of those who had known the earthly Jesus first hand and had witnessed his crucifixion and experienced the presence of the risen Lord.

These first Christians and their response to the risen Christ is important for us to pay very close attention, for their witness can serve as a model and example for our own witness. Like them, we too worship the risen Lord. They may have been 20 centuries closer to the earthly Jesus with faith that was fresh and new. They burned with passion for their faith in a world that was hostile to this new movement. The more this new movement was persecuted by its enemies, the more it grew and expanded. The strength of the Church in any generation from then to now lies in a paying attention to the <u>foundations and the basics</u> of the faith and applying them in our day, our time, and our context.

"They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of the bread and prayers..." In this verse we have perhaps one of the earliest descriptions of the characteristics of early Christian worship. It included an encounter with scripture, "the apostles teaching," in the reading and preaching of the Word. We have the essence of worship which is "koinonia," a word that means fellowship. And then there is the move toward the communion in the "breaking of the bread and prayers."

But notice! It didn't stop there. "All who believed were together and had all things in common; they would sell their possessions and goods and distribute the proceeds to all, as any had need."

Notice how quickly, Luke, the author of Acts, moves from *worship to service*; from *worship to action*; from *word and koinonia to deed* from *Worship to witness*. The first question that hits me right between the eyes is, do I move, do you move, do we move that quickly from worship to action; from centering on the Word and Sacrament in the context of "koinonia" to service and deed? Or when I (you) walk out that door after experiencing the "word," the "koinonia," and "the breaking of the bread" in communion, do I make a quick move to action, service and deed? Do I even think about it? Do you even think about it? Is it even on our minds? *Do we find ourselves energized for action*?







What is the Educational Trust Fund (ETF)?

In 1987, St. Francis of Assisi Parish had the foresight to establish the Educational Trust Fund. The initial campaign raised nearly \$600,000 today the Trust Fund balance exceeds \$1,835,000. The primary purpose of the ETF is to provide long-term financial assistance to our school. The ETF is organized to accomplish this purpose by pooling gifts of money and by investing this permanent fund to generate an income. Each year, five percent of the average of the last three years' beginning fund balance is disbursed to our school - the most recent distribution being \$70,000, the highest ever, for the 2013-2014 fiscal vear.

Our primary ETF fundraising efforts which include the annual Benefit, the Leadership Circle, and Planned Giving, are intended to bring us closer to our long-term goal of a \$10,000,000 corpus, the income from which should go a long way toward ensuring a stable future for our parish school.

Religious Education Classes at St. Francis

St. Francis offers both traditional classes on Mondays and Wednesdays as well as family sessions on Sundays for children in grades preschool through 8th grade. Family Religious Education provides a setting where the parents actively participate in sharing the Faith with their children. Family Religious Education meets twice a month with repeat sessions so that every family can have the opportunity to help their children grow in the faith. Both the traditional classes and the Sunday family sessions include sacramental formation for first Eucharist



and Confirmation. New this year, as an alternative to the traditional Confirmation classes, St. Francis offers a monthly Spirit Session, which features outside speakers sharing their Catholic faith on topics of their expertise and lived experience.

And There Was Light, Life, Service + Justice



Being pulled over by a Michigan state trooper caught me by surprise when after refueling at a gas station I had forgotten to turn on my headlights. The overhead lights were so bright at both at the gas station and on the ramp onto I-96, I did not think of needing them. After a lecture warning me of the dangers of my actions the officer released me to continue with my lights on. Fortunately, no one was seriously injured.

Similar to the need for headlights for driving, we all need to keep our spiritual lights on during the weekdays, in our homes, at work and at school. The light keeps us safe, and, assists us, and those we serve on the journey. During our life journey, each week we exit to the weekend for a time of spiritual refueling with friends and at Church. There at the table of the Lord our light of faith, hope and love is brightened.

Our life is to be a light of hope for all to see. We must intentionally remember to turn our light on. Jesus' birth illuminates our dark world. The Church magnifies his light. Christ's mission for us is to "wake up the world." Live in the light. Be light for all to see. Invite all to be baptized into Christ Jesus.

And, the Light of Christ burning in our hearts strengthens us to care for each other, the stranger and, especially the most vulnerable in our world, those with no headlights on.

Some in our community are experiencing a "New Pentecost", a revival in the life of the Holy Spirit, received especially at our Baptism and Confirmation. Do you recall the flames of the Spirit which descended from Heaven to rest upon the heads of those present? Once the light wakes us we are compelled to take

action. Here are some glimpses of the light burning in our community:

We experienced some special time with the Lord in prayer, devotions and we got to know each other better

during our Historic Church Tour in Toledo in October 2014. We visited Saints Adalbert and Hedwig Parish, had Mass with Fr. 

Business Manager's Report to the Parish: November 2014

Since my last report to you one year ago, many new capital projects have been undertaken, which you have enabled by your increased giving to the Parish. Early in the spring of 2014, we purchased a dozen new Mity-Lite tables for the PAC, as well as 100 new brown folding chairs. We also contracted for upgraded air conditioning in the School and Religious Ed offices, and did some much needed repairs to the Parish Office, including masonry repair (tuckpointing) on the front wall and replacing a roof gutter and windows in the priests' offices. Later in the spring, tuckpointing was completed on the west wall of the PAC and in late June, on the Bell Tower.

Patching of damaged sections of the rear (upper) parking lots was also done in June, followed by sealcoating and re-striping of the lots in early August. Wooden doors on two emergency exits in the School were replaced in June by steel doors with windows and key access from the outside in case of an emergency. We also contracted for a second steam boiler for the K/3 building of our School, which was completely installed and tested by the end of September. This will give us some redundancy in heating that building; for the past five or six years, we have only had one steam boiler there, causing considerable worry every time a severe cold spell would occur. New safety glass was also installed in many classroom doors in the School in August, replacing ordinary glass that had the potential to injure someone in the case of an accident.

Visible to most parishioners is the renovation of the men's and women's restrooms on the lower level of the Church. Renovations included new fixtures, new counters and sinks, some new floor tile in the men's restroom, new foam soap and paper towel dispensers, and fresh new paint. A similar renovation was completed in the Parish Office restroom, where we said good-bye to the plastic (fake ceramic) wall tile and 60-year-old sinks.

Every year at this point in my report I talk about the projects still on a "to do" list. That list, while it still exists, is considerably shorter than in past years. Projects that we would still like to accomplish, should our finances continue to remain healthy, include, in no particular order, addition of a supplemental HVAC system for the Gym, renovating/ upgrading school restrooms on the Middle School level, and replacing old windows in the Music and Art Rooms, Science Lab, and classroom 7A with modern energy-efficient windows with screens. We thank you for your continued support of the Parish and School which allows such improvements to occur. Please feel free to call or email me if you should have any questions or comments.

Let us all bring glory to God by joyfully sharing our blessings!


