Rice Bowls, RWANDA and Lent at St. Francis

Your Rice Bowls Do make a Real difference!

This Lent we, as a parish, participate in the Catholic Relief Services (CRS) Rice Bowl program. Many of us are familiar with the little boxes and the accompanying resources of videos, recipes, stories, and articles. Many of us take the Rice Bowl for granted; it is something we do during Lent. We put in our spare change or write a check out at the end, turn it in, and by the end of Easter Sunday Mass have few thoughts left about that little box. However, thanks to the generosity of St. Francis Parish and the *Called to Witness Program through Catholic Relief Services, I found out exactly what the impact of these simple little boxes is.

In August I journeyed to Rwanda. The point in journeying to this small, east African nation was to see the work that Catholic Relief Services does. What I was overwhelmed by was the respect, admiration, and gratitude offered by all we met toward Catholic Relief Services. From government ministers to diocesan staff to mothers at nutrition sites, all were profuse in their appreciation for what CRS does and how they go about their work.

So what exactly does CRS do with that bit of spare change or check you drop into the Rice Bowl? Let me share with you what I witnessed.

A group of men and women met us at the top of a mountain singing (photo) surrounded by coffee plants. Through a cooperative that was initially supported by CRS but which has since become participant owned, these farmers have created a source of regular income that allows for sustenance of their families, expansion of their community schools, and a savings fund for any hard times ahead. The agricultural education and seed money provided by CRS set this community on their feet, equipping them to be self-sustaining.

A young man we encountered had sold vegetables on the side of the road. A box summed up the equipment he had at his disposal. Through the entrepreneurial programs CRS offered, he received funding to create a small shop. This store has everything from soccer balls to bicycles to batteries. He had hopes, given his immense success, to create a building supplies shop for his village.



"From Worship to Witness" Sixth Parish Common Conference

Over three hundred, spiritually hungry people took part in our sixth Parish Common Conference on January 17th where Deacon Ralph Poyo delivered an inspiring keynote address. He emphasized growing a relationship with Jesus, because how can we share the joy of the Gospel if we don't know Jesus. Deacon invited us to look beyond sacramentalizing our faith.



He talked about faith being a noun AND a verb. Yes, it is important to know the tenets of our faith---we profess the Creed each week at Mass. We also have to take that belief out the door when we leave. Jesus wants us to share our hearts. He wants us to share because we are worth it! Do YOU really want God?

Our conference workshops ranged from finding time for God, to Scriptures, to practical tips for





Each year at St. Francis Parish we reflect upon how our ministers, committees and organized ministries generously deliver a multitude of meaningful events, services and projects.

We especially like to busy ourselves with assisting families with basic needs like food, clothing, housing, transportation, and furniture, as well as, supporting literacy programs, our school, visiting those in jail or prison, the sick and our elderly, we even depend upon prayer and listening ministries. *Mercy! All these efforts might be thought of as seeds or vehicles in which Christ can be present. Although dormant in appearance the seed holds the promise of new life. Jesus says the Kingdom of God is a surprising experience like when scattered seed springs up from the land, sprouting and growing to become a large plant which puts forth large branches. (Mark 4:26-34)

Rite of Christian Initiation (RCIA)

The key to understanding the meaning of Lent is simple: Baptism

During Lent, the focus is on our Elect (unbaptized) and Candidates (valid Baptism from another Christian tradition) as they undergo an intense period of *Purification and Enlightenment*. **The focus is also on all of us as we prepare to RENEW our baptismal promises.**

The **Scrutinies** take place on the Third, Fourth, and Fifth Sundays of Lent. Communal prayers are celebrated to strengthen these men, women, and children to overcome the power of sin in their lives and to grow in virtue. This celebration is not for us to scrutinize these candidates, but for us to look to them as our model and example. We are *all* called to continuing conversion so we join with these people and scrutinize our own lives and pray to God for the grace to overcome the power of sin that still infects our own hearts. We cannot experience the promise of new Life unless we are able to recognize our own need for God's mercy.

In **Baptism**, we are plunged – as the Elect will literally be at Easter Vigil – into the mystery of Christ's death and resurrection and our own baptismal commitment includes a willingness to give our life for others as Jesus did. As we share in the joy of the Elect at their Baptism the night of Easter Vigil, we all renew our promises to live in the JOY of life in the Risen One. Lent comes to its fulfillment around the waters of the font.

During Lent, we also turn our attention to those who may have been away from the practice of our faith. We offer a time to come together and reconnect---with no pressure---to get answers, to learn a bit, and to find hope. Following Easter, this group may meet for five weeks to dig deeper.


For Young Adults: Theology on Tap





We are now accepting Fall 2015 Preschool Enrichment applications for three year old and four year old children.

The Preschool Enrichment I program for **three year olds** meets Monday and Wednesday mornings from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m. and runs from Monday, Sept. 14, 2015 through Wednesday, May 25. Children eligible for Preschool I should be three years of age by Dec. 1, 2015. The total yearly tuition for the Preschool I program is \$625.

The Preschool Enrichment II program for **four year olds** meets Tuesday and Thursday mornings from 9 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. and runs from Tuesday, Sept. 15 through Thursday, May 26. Children eligible for Preschool II should be four years of age by Dec. 1, 2015. The total yearly tuition for Preschool II is \$720.



The Preschool Enrichment programs are designed to give your child a first experience of learning within a faith-filled and loving context. With the guidance of teacher-lead activities, the classes build on the ideas of social play and exploration. The journey into literacy begins though story-telling and learning the alphabet. Science and math concepts are explored through hands-on activities. Music, art, and physical activity help to develop an early love of learning. Woven throughout the curriculum is an introduction to the wonder of God's creation and the love that God has for each individual child.

The First Sunday of Lent, we give you an opportunity to pull one or more personal prayer intentions from those written by fellow parishioners on the *Share Each Other's Burdens* prayer sheets. These are written anonymously and have been both the most challenging and the most rewarding to pray throughout the Lenten season.
