#### St. Francis of Assisi School News

Middle School Students Study The Environment & Their Call To Ecological Stewardship

The goal of the IMEP (Integrated Michigan Environmental Program) is to help our students view themselves as stewards of the Earth with St. Francis of Assisi as a role model. Working both as a member of a team and

individually, students will explore an integrated unit on the environment of Michigan and its relationship to its people, past, present and future.

Here is a general overview of the program:

- Students are divided into 4 teams.
- Teams consist of students from all four homerooms.
- Throughout the year students study various topics pertaining to Michigan and our role as stewards.
- Some of the areas of study are ecology, history, language arts and religion.

The acquisition of all of the background knowledge has brought the students to the final phase of this year's program — the building of their own Schoolyard Habitat which will be sanctioned by the National Wildlife Federation. It is the students' desire to recreate Michigan as it used to be. The habitat will feature plants, grasses, shrubs, flowers and trees which are native to southeast Michigan. On April 22, Earth Day, a prayer service was held to bless the habitat. The entire school came outside to participate in the event led by Fr. Jim. The next day seventeen arborvitae were planted, one by each class. A white pine, the state tree, has also been planted by the eighth grade leadership students and the eighth graders from our sister parish, St. Benedict. A grant from the Pfizer Corporation will enable us to add a permanent weather station and many other exciting lessons for the remainder of the school year. The intent is for this program to be ongoing throughout the school, from kindergarten through eighth grade for many years to come.



#### Reflections on SVDP at St. Francis

St. Vincent de Paul Society (SVDP) at St. Francis has done a lot of growing and re-shaping in the last year. We have identified ourselves as an active conference to both the Council in Lansing and

our counterpart in town, SVDP at St. Thomas. We started small with projects like making lunches for Holy Family Ministries. Then grew in our scope and participation and facilitated the parish to volunteer to serve the hungry at a local soup kitchen during Lent. Our biggest accomplishment has been the start-up of a car donation program. This allows us to do home visits and ask the parish to assist us in providing vehicles to members of our community

in need. SVDP at St. Francis continues to grow in membership and prayer and most importantly in our ability to serve those in need, person-to-person.



On April 29th, the eighth grade students from our sister parish in Highland Park spent the day at St. Francis. The youth from St. Benedict's school came for a retreat on Building Relationships. Everything about the day, from

activities to lunch, revolved around developing relationships with one another and with God.

The day began with ice breakers and hospitality and was followed by an opening prayer service on faith, hope, and love presented by the students from St. Benedict's school. Afterwards they participated in an activity entitled "Our True Colors: Shades of God." During this activity students identified some of the strengths of their particular personality-type and discussed how to recognize and appreciate the gifts that others possess.

Lunchtime itself was a time of learning as students were given various handicaps they needed to overcome. Everyone at a table had to work together to compensate for one another's weaknesses. Their goal was to make sure everyone was able to get enough to eat. The students quickly learned they could not do it alone—they needed one another.

One of the highlights of the retreat involved planting a white pine tree in the St. Francis Habitat. The evergreen tree was planted as a year-round reminder of the relationship developing between the people of St. Francis and the people of St. Benedict's parish.

Perry Nursery parents, 97% of whom are low-income, are working and/or going to school, are assisted through this affordable childeducation to become and/or remain working, contributing, and self-sufficient members of our community in Washtenaw County. These parents pay Perry Nursery School on a sliding scale in addition to receiving a tuition scholarship.

Perry Nursery receives funding from: Washtenaw County United Way, Michigan Department of Education, Michigan Family Independence Agency, parent tuition, grants and donations.

### Tax Assistance "Thanks!"

Charlotte King Since my last report to you in November of 2001, a number of capital projects have been undertaken or completed, although at a reduced pace from prior years in anticipation of the relatively larger Church renovation project. We recently signed a contract for the renovation work, and the contractor is currently awaiting issuance of the appropriate permits from the City of Ann Arbor in order to begin. We ex-

pect construction activity to begin in late May, with the bulk of the construction work completed during the summer. Electrical and mechanical work will likely occur in the fall. Please watch *The Forum* weekly for updates on this project.

The West Parking Lot project was finally completed in January, with the installation of protective grates on the inlets to the original detention pond and the securing of grates on both outlet structures. Under our contract, bushes and trees which did not survive one year are to be replaced by the landscape contractor at no cost to us, which will number several, and that is anticipated to take place in May.

In the Church, a motorized overhead lift was installed on one of the roof support beams in order to suspend the Advent wreath over the center aisle of the Church. Those of you who were here during the Advent and Christmas seasons last year remember just how exciting that location proved to be.

You may recall from my last report that the installation of new playground equipment on the K-1 playground last August resulted in damage to our existing drain from that playground. In September, we contracted for the repair work, which was finally done in December, making the playground usable again; at the same time, the contractor addressed a standing water problem along the north side of the School Music Room (the original Church). In April, the roof of the School Music and Art Rooms was replaced, in accordance with a roof repair and maintenance plan that we have been operating under for several years, and new gutters and downspouts were added to match those on the east side of the School. New vertical blinds were also added to the Music and Art Rooms earlier in the year to replace older horizontal blinds which were beginning to fall apart. These will improve the ability to view videotapes or slides in those classrooms during the day or evening before darkness falls.

Finally, new automatic firedoors were installed at the foot of both K-1 stairwells, which will allow those doors to be propped open during the school day for better ventilation, but which will close automatically upon the triggering of the fire alarm (just as we presently have in the Middle School and  $4^{th}/5^{th}$  grade hallways). As a further improvement to those stairwells, new lighting was installed in each.

As to what is on the agenda in the future, some of the things we are currently working on include replacement HVAC systems for the PAC and the Music/Art Rooms in the School; improved

lighting in the Middle School; improved windows in several locations throughout the School, including grade 4-8 class-rooms and the Gym; repair of the Bell Tower; replacement of the Music Room carpet; and waterproofing of the elevator pit in the School. As we have said in the past, several of our facilities here are nearing 50 years of age, and upkeep was not always done as it should have been.

We continue to attempt, within the constraints of our financial capability, to do what we can to improve the facilities used by all, as rapidly as we can. If we have not upgraded a facility that you think needs upgrading, please give me a call; perhaps it's on our list, which I'll be happy to tell you, but perhaps we're not aware of it, in which case your call would be especially helpful.

Something of which we can all be proud is another "Waste Knot" award, this one for 2002, which was received earlier in May by the Parish and the School from Washtenaw County. That bright green dumpster behind the PAC has accumulated many tons of cardboard and paper products in the three years we have had it, and we appreciate the continuing efforts of those involved in events at the Parish and School to recycle paper products there whenever possible. We have also become more active in recycling compostables, wood pallets, laser printer cartridges, and many other products.

The Parish Financial Report for the fiscal year about to end (June 30, 2002) will be prepared in July and distributed to parishioners in August. At this point in the fiscal year, we are "on budget" on the whole, with the usual positive and negative variances among individual account categories. To summarize briefly, we have sufficient funds to maintain the operations of the Parish and to pay down our debt to the Diocese of Lansing, but we lack the capacity to fund at once the many capital improvements necessary to bring our facilities up to where they should be. As a result, our Finance Council works with me to prioritize our needs so that those which are most critical get addressed first. While this approach is sometimes frustrating, I am confident that you will agree with me that many of our needs have been addressed over the past five years. I have heard from many parishioners over the past year or two, that never have our facilities looked as good as they do now. We intend to continue this in the future.

Again, thank you for your continuing support. With the Church renovation about to commence, thank you in advance for your patience, which I am sure may be sorely taxed before we finish. # Is stockpiling wealth good stewardship?

A dilemma that often occurs for me when I take the meaning of stewardship to its deepest level is this: Is stockpiling wealth good stewardship?

Of course it all depends on what we mean by stockpiling. God gives us clear direction about saving and giving gifts. The laws found in the Old Testament describe offerings to God as either a holocaust where meat is given at the altar in thankfulness and praise, or as atonement where one brings God the gift because of an infringement to another human or to God's laws. These infringements include actions that we are all familiar with: lying, cheating, unfaithfulness to God, gossiping, bragging, hoarding, self-ishness, etc.

And yet God also created many laws that would assure the wealth of Israel would be shared with all people. There are laws that discuss debt-forgiveness. We are to forgive debts of the poor every seven years and offer universal debt-forgiveness every fifty years. The Bible listed specific rules about harvesting, so the poor could also glean food. (In Ann Arbor, we have food gatherers who are essentially living by this law.)

With this in mind, stockpiling great amounts of anything does not seem to fit into God's plan for healthy and functional communities. However, there is a time when stockpiling wealth does serve a greater good. Certainly, Joseph helped Egypt understand the need to save grain for the

future. He interpreted Pharaoh's dream, so they would understand that seven abundant years would be followed by famine. Knowing this, they built granaries all



over the country so all would be fed during the sparse times.

Today, we too try to plan for the future by creating trust funds. Here at St. Francis, our Educational Trust Fund has proven to serve as a great *stewardship-concept*. Fifteen years ago, over \$500,000 was pledged to assure the future of Catholic education. The funds were invested with the Diocese of Lansing, and each year the interest income is distributed. Over \$340,000 has been paid out, while the balance in the fund today is around \$700,000.

This year, we have begun a conscious effort to expand this fund because we see how foresight helps our future. We can make a difference in children's lives through Catholic education. For the families attending St. Francis School in the future, it will be essential to offer affordable tuition for all that choose to attend our school. It's All About the "Yes"

On Monday, May 6<sup>th</sup>, about fifty mothers and daughters gathered to pray the Joyful Mysteries of the Rosary, to share a meal and to honor Mary and the part she plays in the story of our salvation. Dear Bishop Mengeling,

It is with a heavy heart, that the Pastoral Council is writing this letter on behalf of the members of St. Francis of Assisi Catholic Church in Ann Arbor, Michigan and the words do not come easily. As a community, we will not tolerate the sexual abuse of our children or the cover up of this behavior by the very people we hold up as moral standards.

We the people of St. Francis will not remain silent on the subject of the terrible sins committed by members of the clergy. We support the need for very clear, national policy from the Church on the subject of sexual behavior and the strict enforcement of this policy in the future.

At the same time, we would like to demonstrate our support for the many good people in the Catholic Community and our recognition that we too are the Body of Christ and the Church. None of us are safe from the force of evil in our lives and we must keep each other strong so that we are able to resist temptation in whatever form it is presented to us. We choose to support each other with unconditional love through the Eucharist and empowered by the Holy Spirit. During these difficult times, we demonstrate our choice for this life through our individual and group behavior and we are what the world knows as The Catholic Church.

Our prayers are with those who must live with the wrongs inflicted on them. Our prayers are with those who must have the courage and strength to do what is right. We pray that our lives will be a reflection of the faith that we profess and our parish namesake instructs to "preach the gospel always and when necessary use words."
