Families Working Together

Results in a book to pray the Family Stations of the Cross
March 21 & April 11

The St. Francis <u>Family Religious Education</u> program takes place about two Sundays per month. Families gather after the 8:45 mass ~ coffee, juice, doughnuts and bagels in hand ~ to pray, learn and work on projects related to the topic of the day. On February 9th, about 45 families were involved in the process of looking at the world and seeing where Christ is still walking the way to Calvary - through the suffering that is being experienced by people in today's circumstances. Each family took one station and wrote a reflection and a related prayer to Jesus.



The final copy of the prayer book combines the work of two or three families for a particular station. The parish staff will put the finishing touches on the booklet which will be used this Lent to pray the

Stations of the Cross for Families Fridays, March 21 and April 11

at 7 p.m. in the church. Students from St. Francis School will design Stations that will be used by the people gathered, to "walk with Christ" as they pray. Children of the parish will be involved in reading the reflections at each station.

Do you know someone who may want to return to the Church?

We often hear that, "You never can go home again," because it is bound to be a disappointment. That is not so with the Catholic Church. No obligation, no commitments are required, but let's talk.



Renew group meets on the second Sunday of the month immediately following the 5 p.m. Mass hosted by the middle school liturgical ministers.

RENEW Mission Touches Hearts

For three of the four evenings of the RE-NEW Mission that was held in early February, parishioners told the stories of the struggles and successes they have ex-

perienced on their journeys of faith. The openness and vulnerability they expressed offered hope to those who attended. It supported the understanding that we are all *saints in progress*. They spoke of the value of small group relationships to *staying the course* in our faith and of the sustenance that that provides in the valleys and the connectedness, affirmation and acceptance that it continually offers.

Each service of the first three days was presided over by parishioners who introduced the focus for the evening and who lead the assembly in prayer. The three sessions included ten minutes of faith sharing among small groups in the pews. Hearing all the voices participating in this exercise was heartening and was deemed too short a time by comments received afterwards.

Rituals of water, light and incense capped each of those celebrations.

On the last evening, Father James Conlon presided at the concluding liturgy with Father Finian Zaucha concelebrating. Father James' homily encouraged those present to align their personal dreams with the vision of what it means to be a Christian. He also spoke of the value of participation in a small faith sharing group and invited those present to sign up for the RENEW faith sharing groups that are to meet during Lent.

All four evenings ended with food and fun in the Parish Activities Center. Representatives of various ministries within the parish provided the goodies and hospitality.



Oh LORD, Stop Abortion!



Unfortunately, this January marked the 30 year anniversary of the Roe vs Wade decision legalizing abortion on

demand throughout our country. To commemorate this event St. Francis parishioners joined with other Christians throughout Washtenaw County to attend various pro-life events. Our young people were invited to Lifeboat, an ecumenical pro-life youth rally held this year at St. Luke's Lutheran Church on Jan 5th. The following Wednesday we joined the U of M Students for Life for a very cold candlelight vigil to mourn all the children who have died through abortion.

I was impressed by the courage of these young people to stand up publicly on behalf of the unborn. Many people met at the Michigan Union Thursday to hear Professor Richard Meyers from Ave Maria Law School discuss "Abortion: 30 years later". At one point he said that until the American people care enough to speak out against abortion, he felt nothing much would happen in the courts to stop it.

Over the weekend many St. Francis parishioners took home a pro-life candle to display on their porch the night of January 21 to commemorate all the lives lost through abortion. Many thanks to Bob and Therese Rhein and their wonderful family for organizing candle distribution at

all the masses.

Probably the highlight of the pro-life activities was the ecumenical prayer service held at St. Luke's Lutheran Church on January 21. People from many different churches came together to pray for an end to abortion as well as for racial unity, Christian unity, and a real turning to God throughout our county. Our own Fr. Roger Prokop from St. Thomas led us in prayer to stop abortion. He also gave a great talk comparing abortion to destroying something beautiful a person has made to give a friend.

The final event that week was a time of prayer outside of Planned Parenthood. Again I was impressed by the courage and faithfulness of the "regulars" who gather to pray every Thursday morning from 8 to 9am.

Another Roe vs Wade anniversary has come and gone and abortion is still legal. It gets pretty discouraging. But we can't give up!! So please

continue to pray seriously for an end to this injustice against the unborn. Educate yourself and share with your friends what abortion truly is. Ask God what He'd like you to do about it. God bless you!

After the rally (and a delicious pizza dinner),

many of the Catholic youth went to Christ the King for an all county LifeTeen mass. The youth had a great time and heard a very important message.

Catholic youth evangelist, Jim Murphy, was the speaker at this year's rally. His talk was quite inspiring and filled with practical suggestions that we could actually do!! Murphy pointed out that there were steps along the way that led to abortion. Obviously abortion is the result of sexual activity. People often engage in sexual activity because they're looking for love and acceptance. Here, Murphy urged, is where we can get involved. He



urged us to reach out to other young people in our community and our schools who might need a friend. He encouraged us to share God's love with them and invite them into our faith community thus helping them to find love through healthy relationships and ultimately, helping them to find Jesus. He also encouraged us to speak the truth to people. We need to know what

the Bible says about sex outside of marriage and share God's truth with our friends (even though it can be really hard).

Many thanks to Jill Diroff for alerting our youth to this wonderful opportunity. Jill said, "It was great to see so many young people come together from all over the county. Very inspiring. The speaker was great!" Plans are already underway for next year's Lifeboat. You won't want to miss it!.

At the Washtenaw County Jail (one year since the official beginning of Catholic Worship Services, March 23, 2002), inmates are participating in a variety of Catholic services.

Pictured here you can see the assembly of over 30 inmates, 8 volunteers and Fr. Antonio Feghali (the Sacramental Minister at the Jail) celebrating Mass & the sacraments of initiation - Baptism, Confirmation, and

First Holy Communion - with those inmates whom have been studying our Catholic Faith & praying with our community.

What's it like in the Jail?

It's much like a very strict boarding school for adults. Catholics & other persons, in jail, that are interested in learning more about the Catholic faith are invited to

attend services in a class room. We have the weekly Saturday morning Catholic Mass/Liturgy. There are two inquiry group/catechism classes that meet for (12 weeks) on Wednesday evenings. And, the second catechism class is for persons that are already Catholic and have finished the first class.



Growing closer to Jesus, & learning more about the Catholic Faith we encourage spending time with the Lord Jesus in a variety of ways including: One-on-one visits, inquiry group/catechism classes, Eucharistic Adoration, Mass, & Liturgy of the Word.

In the Fall of 2000, St. Francis Pastor, Fr. Jim asked that St. Francis Parish *Social Ministry Office* step forward to start a Catholic ministry at the jail which would offer healing and support to persons (and families of persons) in the jail. Now we are truly blessed to have over 20 active lay volunteers, and about 14 priests, that visit the jail and spread the good news about Jesus and encourage others to live & celebrate the faith.



A group of at least four Catholic volunteers from our parish & other Catholic parishes, visit the jail together. Some volunteers serve on an as needed basis, and, others serve once each month every other week.

Some volunteers never enter the jail facility, but,

they support the ministry by helping with projects such as: Making holiday gift cards; Writing letters as a Pen Pal; Donating \$5 for a Bible or Catechism; Praying for peace & justice in the lives of those whom have been found guilty of awful crimes; Praying for & encouraging the families of those in jail through special programs; And, welcoming those released to Sunday Mass & other groups to meet supportive new friends.


It's Fun To Be In ESP!
