

The Christian Initiation process (RCIA) is open to adults, youth, and children of catechetical age (7 years of age or older) who: have not been baptized/have been baptized Catholic, but have not completed full initiation into the Church through Confirmation and/or Eucharist/have been baptized in another Christian faith/would like to explore Roman Catholicism and make no commitment at this time.

The Celebration of First Holy Communion

The family plays a central role in initiating their children into the mysteries of faith. Preparation at St. Francis for First Communion begins with religious education in the first grade. Generally, in second grade preparation



for the sacraments of First Penance (celebrated in December) and First Eucharist (celebrated in May) begins. Preparation consists of education in the classroom, and four parent and child meetings for the two sacraments.

Confirmed in the Spirit & Commissioned for Service

On March 23, Bishop Mengeling came to St. Francis to confer the Sacrament of Confirmation upon 130 young people. Family and friends gathered to join in the celebration as the candidates were sealed with the Gift of the Holy Spirit.

In his remarks to the candidates, Bishop Mengeling congratulated the young people for making a good choice. In choosing to be confirmed, he said, the candidates were inviting the power of the Holy Spirit to be with them to guide them in the many choices they will make throughout their lives. Bishop Mengeling also reminded the youth that it is in the Sacrament of Baptism that they discover who they are as Children of God. It is in the Sacrament of Confirmation, however, where they are given their mission and learn what they are to do.

The rigorous formation process that the candidates had just completed helped to prepare them to carry out this mission. The young people had studied the faith and researched what the Catholic Church teaches in many areas relative to living in today's difficult world. They had also studied the lives of those who had remained faithful to the gospel despite various trials and hardships. In addition, the candidates developed

their awareness of God's presence with us through the working of the Holy Spirit, especially at their retreat and through various prayer experiences. Finally, through the service component of their preparation process, the candidates practiced what a life lived for Jesus should look like. Each of these young people performed a minimum of 30 hours of service for their families, the parish, and the community. In total, the candidates performed over 3900 hours of service in Jesus' name! It appears that these young people are off to a great start in living out their mission of service.

May the power of the Holy Spirit continue to help you choose wisely and strengthen you to faithfully live out your mission.



Middle School Students & Parents: Talk About Chastity

With its many signs of new life, spring seems to be the natural time to talk about the "Birds and the Bees." The months of March and May, therefore, were chosen for the annual parent and youth talks about sexuality. The seventh grade students and their parents met on March 19 and the sixth graders and their parents met on May 7 to discuss this important topic.

The goal of both programs was simple: To get parents and youth together to talk about issues dealing with sexuality. In today's fast-paced world, setting aside a time specially designated for such a discussion is extremely important. Otherwise, despite our best intentions, it simply won't happen.



So, what makes this program different from any other?

In addition to reviewing the many physical and psychological changes that occur during puberty, these programs stress God's plan for our sexuality. The virtue of chastity is defined as purity of heart, mind, and body. Chastity is a virtue, or a good habit, that *everyone* is called to practice regardless of our state in life. Participants identify behaviors they can adopt right now that will help them live a chaste life. The program strives to show how living a chaste life ensures that we are using our gifts of sexuality to give glory to God and, in the end, will bring true and lasting happiness for ourselves.

Children Enter the Catholic Faith through: The Children's Catechumenate


Along with adults who are inquiring about the Catholic faith, children often express an interest in wanting to know more about Jesus and answering God's call already given to them. This process includes children who are at least 7 years of age who have never been baptized or have been baptized and have not received any instruction in their faith. Their innocence

and vulnerability allow them to be open to God's call to come, to trust to be fed and nourished. The children share their faith stories while breaking open the word on Sunday's readings as well as praying, singing, telling stories, participating in crafts and eating together.

Understanding the Last Supper:

St. Francis Religious Education Program
Looks at the Paschal Mystery



On Wednesday of Holy Week this year, families from the Religious Education program gathered together to prepare for the Triduum (Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Easter vigil), in anticipation of celebrating Christ's Victory over death in Easter.

The paschal mystery of Christ's passion, death, and resurrection is the Good News of Jesus Christ, who redeemed us from slavery to sin and has given us a share in the freedom of God's life.

About 280 people celebrated a passover service designed for child involvement, and based on the biblical and historical traditions of Jesus' last supper. Understanding the roots and context of the last supper lends itself towards greater understanding of the paschal mystery.
