
Attention all High School Teens!

A Tour of Biblical Proportions Takes Place

The Dead Sea Scrolls were discovered in the middle of the 20th century. It was a marvelous find that had a huge bearing on the Bible. The scrolls have created a good deal of controversy. The story of the scrolls was made accessible to the people of Michigan through a recent exhibit at the Van Andel Museum Center in Grand Rapids.



Fifty-five people from St. Francis participated in a tour on April 8th, the day after the big ice storm that staggered most of the state. However, it didn't stop our people from getting on the bus. They had been looking forward to this day. A little weather was not going to get in the way of this opportunity to see for themselves the scrolls that they had heard so much about.

The exhibit did not disappoint. Through an introductory movie and self-guided tour with individual listening devices, participants were able to immerse themselves into the climate, culture and history of the era when Judaism as we know it today was formed; the time when Christianity was born, and the time when the seeds of Islam were sown.

Books on the Dead Sea Scrolls have been purchased for the parish library. The new location in the church is expected to be up and running this fall. Parishioners will soon be able to borrow these books for study or personal enrichment.

Elizabeth Ministry: Helping Parishoners in Need

People often ask me what it's like to belong to a parish as big as St. Francis. "Don't you feel anonymous?" "Do people even recognize one another?" "Does your priest know who you are?" ... are just a few of the questions that I hear. My answers are always the same. St. Francis is the most wonderful parish



that a person could belong to. It is our numbers that allow us to reach out and give a personal touch to parishioners in need, and to serve others in our community.

A First Hand Experience

The Elizabeth Ministry is a wonderful example of how the many parishioners at St. Francis work together. October this year, my daughter Briona was born with Hypo Plastic Left Heart Syndrome - a very rare, and very serious congenital heart defect. A family friend tipped off the Elizabeth Ministry even before my daughter was born, and our family was provided with laundry help and meals. When my daughter was born, it was very difficult to balance being with her at the hospital and taking care of my husband and three other children at home. For more than three months the wonderful, selfless women of this ministry came to the aid of my family. Their wonderful meals, friendly smiles, and notes of prayer were a beacon of light to me during one of the darkest times in my life. I was often so sad and confused that I never even got to thank each of them personally, yet the meals still came, the laundry was folded, and I knew that I had many wonderful women and their families praying for my little girl.

Sadly, my little Briona never got to come home. After three open heart surgeries, and a long wait for a new heart that never came, she was called back to God. During the long and painful weeks of grief, the Elizabeth Ministry was there to comfort and provide for my family when I couldn't. I will never be able to thank these wonderful women (and men) enough, so as a start I decided to join the Elizabeth Ministry myself. My family and I look forward to the day when we can help someone else in the way which we were helped.

St. Vincent de Paul Fund



Our Parish, through the St. Vincent de Paul (SVDP) Fund, offers financial assistance to persons in need. During the last six months, January – June 2003, this fund has been used to help more than 33 struggling persons & families with: Car Repairs, Housing Rent, Budget Counseling, Groceries, Funeral Burial, Medical Prescriptions, Dental Work, Electric Bill, etc...

Our Parish, St. Vincent de Paul Society Members, work hard to meet face to face with real people struggling, by making visits to the home of persons in need with real HOPE. Thank you for your prayers for this ministry & for your contribution to the SVDP Fund!

Since my last report to you in November of 2002, the number of capital projects undertaken has continued to diminish, largely as a result of a slowing of Sunday donations. Our major project, the renovation of the Church, is nearing completion, with only a few items left to finish. Principal among these are some electrical issues, such as light fixtures which had to be back-ordered, and a new handrail on the lower front stairs. We have had some difficulty with the heating element on the new Baptismal font, and a minor piping change has been specified by the architect and engineer to address the problem. In addition, the artist carving the Holy Family sculpture has fallen behind schedule, but we hope to have the sculpture installed before the end of the summer as well. The cost of the renovation continues to be on target, with the only appreciable add-on for unanticipated asbestos ceiling removal. Comments that I have received about the appearance of the rear of the Church and the new entryway and vestibule have been almost unanimously favorable, and we hope that you agree that the changes make the Church more functional and welcoming than ever before!

We were forced to replace the over-20-year-old heating/air-conditioning system in the PAC in late December, and the new system has run very reliably since. We also added air-conditioning in the Science Lab and an adjacent classroom of the School, thanks to a designated donation of

one of our School parents. Although the weather this spring has not been hot enough to use it on many days, early reports are that it, too, has made a hit with our students and faculty.

The only other projects of note were the addition, just before Easter, of another 160 new brown folding chairs for the PAC, representing a significant increase in number of chairs available for use there, and the replacement of the principal hot water heater for the PAC and School, which died unexpectedly during the winter.

We have contracted for the installation of new, energy-efficient windows throughout the remainder of our School during summer vacation; these will be paid for entirely from School Development efforts. For years, our parents and staff have talked about replacing the old, drafty, single-pane windows in our School buildings which dated back 40-50 years; by the time classes resume in late August, we expect that this will finally have been accomplished!

Projects which remain on our "to-do list" include improved lighting in the Middle School, repair of the Bell Tower, upgrading of the Choir Room on the lower level of the Church, continuing roof replacement (including some necessary repairs to the Church roof), demolition of the house next to the West Parking Lot on Stadium Boulevard and re-grading of that property, and the eventual addition of air conditioning throughout our School buildings. Aside from the Church roof repair work, which should be covered by the manufacturer's warranty, the remaining projects continue to be on "hold," pending improvement in parish revenues.

Perhaps a comment is appropriate on the subject of Church offering envelopes. Many of you have experienced difficulty lately in receiving your quarterly envelope packets in a timely manner. We have worked with our printer and with the Postal Service to resolve the problem, and every time we think that it has been solved, another problem with the Postal Service pops up. Most recently, envelopes which were to have been delivered to you in April, and were delivered by the printer to the Postal Service in Detroit on April 17th, took as much as five weeks to reach our parishioners! We have not given up, however. We will be making another change in the distribution of our next packet of quarterly envelopes, which will go out in July for the months of August, September, and October, and we remain hopeful that this change will result in more timely delivery to parishioners. In the meantime, should you not have your regular envelopes, please feel free to use the Visitor envelopes in the pews; we review each and every one received in order to properly credit donations to each donor's account.

Business Manager's Report to the Parish May 2003

Finally, a brief word is in order on the subject of Church revenues. Through the end of May, our Sunday donations were down almost 4% from last year's level, which appears, from the historical records we have been able to locate, to be unprecedented in the history of this parish. No one knows for

sure why this is occurring, although there are many possible explanations. Compounding the difficulty is the continuing rapid escalation in the cost of health-care insurance for our employees, which, of course, is a problem for all employers throughout Michigan and the nation. We have responded to it, as a parish, by reducing some staff positions, eliminating almost all salary raises for the next fiscal year, taking still another hard look at each of our programs, and putting capital projects on the back burner for the time being. That is not to say that such projects will not be done, but we shall be overly cautious in assessing our ability to fund them, which will, in all likelihood, mean that they will proceed much more slowly than in the past six years that I have been here.

We are hopeful that, as our Capital Fund Drive and the Building Fund Drive for the new Fr. Gabriel Richard High School are now ending, many of you will take this opportunity to examine the level of your support to <u>our</u> Parish. Know that we continue to manage the financial affairs of the parish in a careful and prudent manner, for we are truly trying to accomplish God's work with your dollars. We hope and pray that you will find an opportunity for increased support of the parish in the future, and we remain thankful for the support that you have provided us in the past.
